+ Fr. Orlando Ruiz, O.F.M. +

As we continue to journey through the remaining months of this *'Year of Consecrated Life,'* we have been sharing a little profile and history of each of the Religious members of our Staff and community here at Our Lady of Peace Church. In a *'descending order,'* starting with the *'eldest'* member of our Parish Staff, we have now profiled, *Sr. Margarita Barrera (the 'Senior' member of our Community), Fr. Patrick Boyle ('Pastor of our Parish), Fr. Brian Jordan ('Chaplain' at St. Francis College, who is 'in residence' here at Our Lady of Peace), Sister Irix Mejia, (the 'Religious Superior' of the Community of Sisters who Staff our Parish),* and now, *Fr. Orlando Ruiz,* our *'Pastoral Associate'* here at Our Lady of Peace.

Fr. Orlando arrived at Our Lady of Peace, during the last week of February, 2010, and after his many years of formation in the seminary, and then several parish assignments, was *"finally back home!"* Born *'Orlandito'* Ruiz, on the 20th day of February 1975 in Manhattan, he is the son of Mercedes Peleaz and Guillermo Ruiz. His mother is Ecuadorian and his father is Puerto Rican, so even though he was born in New York City, *'Spanish'* was spoken at home and is his *'native tongue.'* Growing up and being educated in the schools of upper Manhattan and then Hunter College, where he was a psychology major, he became versed in *'English'* as well *(and his language skills didn't end there!)*

In 1998, Fr. Orlando, moved from Manhattan to Brighton, Massachusetts, where he was received as a *'Postulant'* in the formation program of the Franciscan Friars, Province of the Immaculate Conception. Following his year of *'postulancy,'* he moved again, and entered the *'Novitiate'* of the Order which was located in Catskill, New York. Upon completion of his *'canonical year'* as a novice, now, *'Friar'* Orlando professed his first vows and moved on to the next level of the formation program. This move, saw him traveling to Rome, Italy where he continued his studies for the next five years in preparation for priesthood at the Pontifical University of St. Anthony *(the 'Antonianum')* and it was while a student in Rome, that Fr. Orlando acquired the command of a *'third'* language . . . *Italian!*

Upon the completion of his formal studies, he made his *'Solemn Profession'* of vows on September 17, 2005 and then was ordained a *'transitional deacon,'* two months later, on November 17th. Following his deaconate experience, he was ordained to the priesthood of Jesus Christ on June 8, 2006 through

the calling together of the community in prayer, and the laying on of hands by *His Eminence, Oscar Cardinal Rodriguez* from the Archdiocese of Tegucigalpa, Honduras.

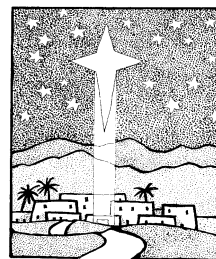
Due to his proficiency in speaking three languages, Fr. Orlando's first assignments saw him ministering in several parishes in Toronto, Canada, where there was a great need for clergy who could minister to the large Italian communities there. At the Church of the Immaculate Conception, the Church of St. Jane Frances de Chantal and the Church of Saint Charles Borromeo, Fr. Orlando met that need, and ministered to the people of God, primarily in the Italian language *(keep in mind, this was not his native tongue!)*

Finally, getting *'closer to home,'* Fr. Orlando then came back to the United States and spent a short time as an associate pastor at the Church of St. Joseph in Winsted, Connecticut, before coming full circle and returning to the greater New York City area here in Brooklyn, where he was finally able to minister in his native tongue of Spanish!

Proficient in the Spanish language, and sensitive to the ethnic customs and cultural traditions of the Hispanic people, Fr. Orlando, is truly *'at home,'* here at Our Lady of Peace and an asset in addressing the spiritual needs of our ever growing Hispanic community. He will celebrate his *'Tenth Anniversary'* of Priesthood this coming June, and we pray that God will continue to work through him, as a minister of our church, for many years to come.

+ Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini +



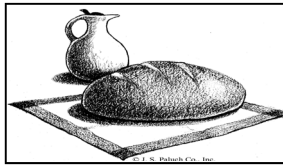
This Friday, November 13th, is the feast day of *St. Frances Xavier Cabrini,* also affectionately known as *'Mother Cabrini.'* She is special to us for two rather important reasons. As a religious, and the foundress of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart, her ministry was quite extensive here in the greater New York City area, where she established orphanages, schools, hospitals and nursing homes. *(I worked for six years at 'Cabrini Nursing Home,' located in Dobbs Ferry, New York, which was the last piece of property that Mother Cabrini actually purchased before her death in 1917.)* She is also special to us for the fact that, in 1946, she became the *first 'American citizen' to be canonized* when she was elevated to sainthood by Pope Pius XII. Born in Lombardi, Italy, she came to New York in 1889 and eventually became an American citizen. St. Frances Cabrini, an immigrant to our country herself, is the *'Patroness of Immigrants.'*



Veterans Day

WORLD WAR I - known as *“the Great War,”* officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919 in the Palace of Versailles, outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an *‘armistice,’ (or temporary cessation of hostilities)* between the Allied nations and Germany, went into effect on the *‘eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.’* For that reason, November 11th was regarded as the end of *‘the war to end all wars,’* and was originally referred to as *‘Armistice Day.’* However, in 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen in the Nation’s history, and after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, Congress changed the word *‘Armistice’* to *‘Veterans’* and November 11th became a day to honor *“all American veterans of all wars.”*
